
Blue challenge





Now, as you have seen, there were many strict rules that children had to follow in Victorian schools – even stricter than the rules you have now!

Choose a challenge to complete:

Red challenge

Can you fill in the correct punctuation? Read the instruction text and identify where the capital letters and full stops go.

Green challenge

Read the instruction text and create some rules for Victorian school children. You can write a numbered list of all of your rules based on the ones mentioned in the text. Remember that rules are commands, so use imperative verbs (bossy verbs) in each sentence. *E.g. shut, close, sit.*

You can even include the conjunction 'or' to include a punishment if the rule is not followed!

E.g. Put your hand up only if you are asked to **or** you will have to sit with your hands placed on your head for the rest of the day.

Blue challenge

Can you create some of your own rules for your Victorian School? Pretend that you are a Victorian School teacher. How strict will you make your school? Write a list of rules that the children in your class must follow. You can use the information in the text and what you have read about Victorian Schools on bitesize. Don't forget to make them very strict! Remember that rules are commands, so use imperative verbs (bossy verbs) in each sentence.



E.g. shut, close, sit.

You can even include the conjunction 'because' or 'so that' to explain why that rule is in place.

E.g. Sit with your hands firmly on the desk where I can see them, **so that** you are not tempted to fiddle.

Victorian Inventions

Many people believe the majority of inventions used today are recent and created during the 20th Century, but in actual fact, many of the essentials used in day to day life were invented during the Victorian era. Although most of these would now look extremely outdated, a lot of them provide the backbone for many modern day creations.

For example, many people claimed to have created the notable British postage stamp throughout our history. However, an Englishman, Sir Roland Hill (who was a schoolmaster) is credited with the invention of the first postage stamp in 1840 – later known as the Penny Black stamp and sporting the image of Queen Victoria's head. How is this stamp similar or different to the ones we use today?



What other inventions can you discover that were made during the Victorian Era (1837 – 1901)?

Create a poster of all the inventions that you discover and draw some pictures of what you have found. You may want to accompany your pictures with some fascinating facts that you have learnt. Here are some things for you to consider:

- What year was this invention created?
- Who created this invention?
- Why did they create this invention? Why was it needed/ useful?
- Do we still use this invention today?
- How has this invention improved or developed over time?

Romanticism (also called the Romantic era or the Romantic period) is a style of art, literature and music that was developed during the Victorian era.

Romanticism was a style where feelings, imagination, nature, and old folk traditions such as legends and fairy tales were important.

In music the orchestra became bigger with more instruments added and composers would also write fantastic pieces for the piano which had become more advanced than it had been before.

'Enigma Variations' by Edward Elgar

Elgar was an English composer from the Romantic era. His 'Enigma Variations' are a set of pieces describing his friends – they are like musical portraits.

How the orchestra developed during Victorian times

The new Romantic style of music that developed during the Romantic era used a bigger orchestra that featured instruments that had been redesigned and improved such as the flute and oboe.

There were also new instruments invented such as the tuba.

Victorian PE!

Here are some fun ways for you to keep fit at home, Victorian style! You can do these on your own, or with other members of your household.

As well as playing with toys, Victorian children also played these games for fun!



Hopscotch (Numeracy link)

Use chalk outdoors for children to have a go at creating their own hopscotch patterns.

Rock, Paper, Scissors (with a PE twist!)

Explain the rules – rock beats scissors, scissors beats paper, paper beats rock. Play as a chasing game! With their partner, play 'Rock, Paper, Scissors' and the 'winner' of each round has to catch their partner before they touch the wall (homie).





Skipping

Give children the opportunity to play with skipping ropes freely and experiment with different kinds of skipping.

Hoops

Victorian children would race each other rolling iron hoops up and down the street with a stick. Use hula hoops for children to practise rolling along and when they are ready, have some races!





Leapfrog (Numeracy link)

In pairs, children practise leapfrog! Encourage them to count how many jumps they can do in a row with their partner before getting tired! Potential to practise counting in 2s, 5s, 10s, etc. whilst leaping.

- 5. Can we have some chill time with your family? Let's just hang out.

- 6. We need to work out and keep up our fitness. Let's get strong together.
- 7. Can you be the teacher for the day? Show us some of your Victorian facts.
- 8. Let's just play outside. There is so much to do in the sunshine.
- 9. You know we're not great at drawing. Can you teach me to draw some pictures?
- 10. Hmm, when was the last time you helped out around the house? Let's do some chores together.
- 11. You know we love Random Acts of Kindness. Let's see yours.
- 12. Maybe we could try to make our own Victoria Sponge Cake.
- 13.Let's do a Victorian research activity together. Can you find out what sorts of toys children played with in the Victorian times?
- 14. Choose your own Victorian Adventure! Maybe you could spend some time working in a Victorian factory, or have a school day in a Victorian school. Surprise us:)
