This is a folk song from Ghana in Africa. It is a bit like 'Heads. Shoulders, knees and toes'. Each time a line is sung you point to a part of your body.

It is a call and response song where someone is the leader and sings the line first and then the other singers sing it back.

Learn the song and sing it with your family.

Can you find some things in your house that can be the sticks, shaker and drum and play along to these parts in the song?

If you have an instrument that can play the notes D and A like a xylophone, then you could also play that part in the song.

Sleeping Lions

Forget freeze dance, the lazy lions are too tired for that kind of action. Instead, play some music and have your party guests prowl around the dance floor, roaring like lions. When the music stops, instead of freezing, the kids will fall to the floor and lie still like sleeping lions. The last child to become a sleepy lion is out of the game. Start the music again and play for as many rounds as it takes until only one player remains.

Flags

Each African country has its own flag of meaningful colors: green symbolizes growing things, yellow symbolizes the sun, red the blood of the people, blue the sea, white peace, and black the people or African freedom.

Have a go at creating your own flag, be sure to explain what the colors used mean to you!





Rain Sticks

For centuries many tribes have used rain sticks to summon the rain. You can fill paper towel rolls with rice, beans etc. Cover the ends with a small circle of poster board and masking tape. Then paint. SAVE THOSE PAPER TOWEL ROLLS! Cover the end w/poster board and clear tape, then filled it with rice.

Experiment with the sound of different amounts of rice. When you like the sound, tape up the other end.
