In your pack each week we will try to include:


- Open ended project ideas and research topics




Day	Tasks	Completed?


Pirate Treasure






Sewing Activity

Pirates need a pirate ship. This pirate ship will show off your super sewing skills!

For this activity you will need;

- Paper bag cut into two semi-circles (half-moon)
- Tape to tape your semi-circles together
- Stuff to decorate your pirate ship
- Hole punch to punch holes around the edge of your boat
- Wool, string or even an old shoelace to sew your pirate ship together.
- Newspaper or scrape paper to fill your ship before you finish all the sewing to give your pirate ship depth
