



PE & Sports Funding

The Primary Physical Education & Sport Premium must be spent by maintained schools and academies on improving the provision of PE and sport for the benefit of pupils so that they develop healthy lifestyles.

Maintained schools must publish, on their website, information about their use of the PE and Sport Grant allocation. This should include the amount of grant received; how it has been spent (or will be spent) and what impact the school has seen on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment as a result, to help to ensure that all pupils develop healthy lifestyles.

How we spent our Sports Premium		
1	<p>Increased provision of sports delivery in the curriculum from Primary Sports (professional services for PE in the curriculum, plus Saturday football in Blackheath).</p> <p><i>This service ensures that all classes receive at least two sessions of high quality PE tuition every week, one indoors and one outdoors, to encourage healthy and active lifestyles.</i></p>	£8,000
2	<p>Enhanced provision of swimming tuition to Years 3, 4 & 5</p> <p><i>Until the introduction of the Sport Premium, children in Years 3 and 4 received a number of swimming lessons (around 8) in one term of the academic year. We have used the PE & Sports funding to increase the number of swimming lessons for each class to 12, and this year we intend to extend the lessons to include 12 lessons for Year 5 children. This will allow children to practice and consolidate what they have learned, and develop skills which will last. We aim for all children to be able to swim 50m or more by the end of Year 6.</i></p>	£4,000
3	<p>School Swimming Charter</p> <p><i>Annual charge to sign up for ASA's Charter and commit to 'Taking Swimming Seriously'. Includes charter document, resource pack, badges & certificates, waterproof guidance cards, school swimming passports and digital resources</i></p>	£120

1	The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kickstarting healthy active lifestyles	<p>The increase in provision from Primary Sports ensures that all pupils receive at least two sessions of high quality PE tuition every week, one indoors and one outdoors, to encourage healthy and active lifestyles.</p> <p>In the years since the Sport Premium has been in place the school has seen a huge decrease in obesity, as all children embrace a more healthy, active lifestyle. This is backed up by the height and weight data collected by the NHS from Reception and Year 6 children every year.</p>
2	The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement	<p>As part of our broad and balanced curriculum, we have used the Sport Funding to ensure that PE is given a higher profile across the school, through a greater number and range of activities.</p> <p>Reports from every sports festival are published in the PE notice board in the playground and on the school website, as well as in the half-termly school newsletter.</p>
3	Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport	<p>Team teaching from the School Sports Co-ordinator ensures that all teachers are confident and can provide high quality sports tuition.</p> <p>Team teaching increases teachers' knowledge, understanding and confidence in teaching PE and helps with teaching progression.</p>
4	Broader experience of a range of sports activities offered to all pupils	<p>The increased provision from Primary Sports and the School Sports Co-ordinator ensure that children can experience a wider range of activities.</p> <p>Children participate in at least ten sports festivals throughout the year which involve as many pupils as possible in all year groups and gender.</p>
5	Increased participation in competitive sports	<p>Participation in sports festivals through the School Sports Co-ordinator and football tournaments through Primary Sports ensure that pupils have a greater opportunity to take part in competitive sports.</p>
