





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#### P.E. Kit Reminder

PE lessons have a multitude of direct benefits for pupils, such as promoting a healthy lifestyle. At Dalmain, PE lessons are taught with the following aims in mind:

- To meet the requirements of the national curriculum
- To encourage physical activity and exercise
- To build self-esteem, confidence and resilience
- To develop pupils' academic, social and physical ability
- To encourage good behaviour and respect amongst pupils
  To promote teamwork and cooperation amongst pupils



With these aims and the benefits that PE has in mind, it is important that your child attends school with the appropriate PE kit. At Dalmain, pupils are expected to wear:

- White t-shirt (school badge optional)
- Dark blue/grey/black shorts or jogging bottoms
  - Dark coloured trainers for outdoor PE

It should be noted that pupils will be expected to remove any piercings, watches and tie long hair up. Children should not be wearing branded sports tops/jerseys.

As a reminder, on the day/s that your child has PE, they should come into school already dressed in their PE kits and remain in these clothes for the whole day. You do not need to send in school uniform on PE days, but PE clothing will be required to adhere to the above expectations.

Please be advised that PE is a compulsory part of the national curriculum and that participation is expected, unless your child has a certified injury or illness. If you have any concerns or need support with uniform, please do not hesitate to contact the School Office or Ms Wilkinson.

## Nursery-Unicorn Class

We completed exciting science experiments to investigate how rockets explode in the air during a coke and mints experiment. It was very exciting to see the liquid shoot up into the air.

There have been many celebrations and festivals to find out about. We have learnt about Remembrance Day, Bonfire Night, Diwali, Hanukah and now Christmas. It was lots of fun making poppies out of natural materials in the Forest School and we loved making Rangoli patterns with coloured rice.



The excitement and engagement with our new Dalmain House Points system has been palpable across the term. A huge well done and thank you to everyone for their hard work and for the many House Points earned!

The House Point system is a fun way we will reward and acknowledge the brilliant behaviour choices our pupils make in a school day. This helps to promote high expectations of behaviour with a consistent reward system throughout the school.

We have based our house names on the history of Dalmain and our wonderful local area, and this term the Houses received the below points:

Children in Year 3 have also been learning about seasonality and food pyramids. Our DT project has culminated in them making a delicious Somerset stew and parsley mash!







# Year 3-Griffin Class



What a great term we have had in Griffin Class!

Year 3 have enjoyed reading 'The BFG' by Roald Dahl in our English lessons. We were so fascinated by the heartwarming tale of friendship and bravery in the story that we wanted to tell our own version.

The stories that we created embarked on an adventure with a child and friendly giant. In our Teaching of Reading lessons, we explored the themes of loneliness, emotions

and friendship in the book 'Small in the City' by Sydney Smith. This picture book shows children

that sometimes we can all feel a little overwhelmed and that is ok.



In Maths we have been focusing on the multiplicative composition of multiples of ten using manipulatives such as base ten blocks and part whole models to facilitate our learning. We have now started looking at mass and we have been practising using a weighing scale.



In Science, we have been investigating different rock types and identifying the names of each rock. We even carried out our science experiment to investigate which rock type would float and sink. This was so much fun! In Geography, Griffin Class have been locating the UK and its major capital cities through using an atlas, globe and Digi-map to support our learning.

We hope you all have a lovely Christmas! We can't wait to see you again in 2024!

# Year 3-Makara Class



#### What a super term for Year 3!

In English, we read Roald Dahl's 'The BFG'. Inspired by this wonderful story, we created 'friendly' and 'evil' giants to create our own adventure tale based on the novel. We have since finished the term with Sydney Smith's, 'Small in the City'. We wrote poems based on the novel, using expanded noun phrases to depict city life.

In Maths, we have continued our place value

topic. We enjoyed playing the 'rounding game' to identify the nearest hundred to a given three digit number.

We started the term in Science with our nutrition topic. We created our own menus to provide customers with a balanced diet. We have since moved onto exploring and investigating different rocks. We have observed rocks closely and drawn their differences, including layers and crystals. We then conducted experiments to see whether different types of rock would sink or float and which rocks would have a chemical reaction with acid (vinegar). It was all very exciting!

# TALKING TEENS 📭



Family Thrive Early Help Co-ordinators are running a free course for parents or carers of teenagers and pre-teens who are looking to better understand and communicate with them – It offers an opportunity to understand what's going on in the adolescent brain and how to understand their feelings and behaviours using an authoritative parenting style. Sessions will focus on relationships within the family, communication, negotiation, decision-making and strategies to reduce conflict.

#### The group aims to develop:

# Year 5-Kraken Class



This half term, Kraken Class have enjoyed an out-of-this-world learning experience around our Science topic: Earth and Space. We learnt about all things planets, moons, suns and more. We worked towards writing our final outcome, a piece of extended writing where we imagined, planned and wrote our very own epic tale, inspired by the travels of Odysseus.



In History, we explored the culture, society and achievements of the Ancient Greeks, comparing different city states and assessing the impact of their legacy on modern society. We are really looking forward to next half term, especially our class trip to the Planetarium!

# Year 5-Chimera Class

This half term, Chimera class have been on an incredible journey based around the theme of Power Vs Principles. In English, the children have immersed themselves in the timeless tale of the Odyssey, writing chilling diary entries as Odysseus and creating their own epic narratives. Chimera Class have continued to develop their comprehension skills through reading the fascinating (and beautifully illustrated) book, 'Mythologica'.



We have learnt how to multiply and divide three-digit numbers by one-digit


In DT & Art, we were amazed to have won the top architect award from our Open City project. Some of the year group went up Tower Hamlets to collect the award on our behalf and they were impressed with the other city models created by the other entrants. We were all super excited to receive our keys to the City of London and the fact that we can now take our sheep for a walk across London Bridge! We are now developing our anatomical drawing skills based on Leonardo da Vinci, by drawing figures, faces and features.

At the beginning of the term, many of us completed an application to become a Young Leader. It was a rigorous process and we were interviewed by Ms Wilkinson for the role. We are now going to be doing some training before we begin our new role of being ambassadors for Dalmain and helping other children at playtimes by organising games and activities.

In English, we have been reading 'The Promise' by Nicola Davies and we have been creating our own sequel to the story. In our Laban Lessons, we have also been creating a dance routine for the story. We have also learnt how to read dance notation, which was created by Rudolf Laban. Dance notation is the symbolic representation of human dance movement and form, using methods such as graphic symbols and path mapping.

In Science, for our electricity topic, we have been reviewing and building on our knowledge of how to draw and build circuits. We developed our knowledge and inquisitive skills further by building salty circuits! This is an electrical circuit that uses saltwater as part of the circuit. We investigated the conductivity of saltwater, and how the amount of salt in a solution affects the flow of electricity through the circuit. We were able, after much trial and error, to build a circuit that lit up a bulb.







#### **Attendance**

Your child's attendance at school every day is vital for their progress and attainment, both academically and socially. Poor attendance can affect children's ability to make and keep friendships, which is a vital part of growing up, and of course we don't want any child falling behind academically at this crucial time in their educational careers.

We have high aspirations for every child, and we are committed to enabling all of our pupils to achieve and sustain the highest level of attendance, believing that every lesson counts. We encourage good attendance for these reasons and to fulfill our statutory safeguarding responsibilities.

#### 90% Threshold for Absences

We work directly with families to support good attendance and punctuality. When a child has **20 or more days off** school during the year, their attendance will be 90% or below.

#### **Attendance Letters**

If your child's attendance falls to 90% or below, you will receive a letter regarding this. If your child's attendance does not improve in four weeks you will receive another letter, and if your child's attendance still fails to improve then you will be invited into the school for an attendance panel meeting.

#### Sessions Missed

Each 'session' equates to half a day; if your child has missed 10 sessions for example, this means that they have missed 5 days of school.

#### Covid Absences–DfE changes since September 2021

Unfortunately, should your child have Covid this will now

affect your child's attendance as per the DFE guidelines, which changed at the start of last academic year.

When your child is off school, please confirm this in writing via email. You will be asked to provide proof of any appointments your child may have to the School Office either in person, so that the school can retain a photocopy, or you can attach any relevant documents via email.

Alternatively you can report absence via ParentMail under Absences.

#### WHY DOES GOOD ATTENDANCE MATTER?

Above 97%	Less than 6 days absence a year	Excellent attendance! These young people will almost certainly get the best grades they can, leading to better prospects for the future. Pupils will also get into a habit of attending school which will help in the future.	
95%	10 days absence a year	These pupils are likely to achieve good grades and form a habit of attending school regularly. Pupils who take a 2 week holiday every year during term time can only achieve 95% attendance.	
90%	19 days absence a year	Young people in this group are missing a month of school per year; it will be difficult for them to achieve their best.	
85%	29 days absence a year	The Government classes Young People in thi group as "Persistent Absentees", and it will b almost impossible to keep up with work.	
		Parents of young people in this group could also face the possibility of legal action being taken by the Local Authority.	

#### WHY DOES GOOD PUNCTUALITY MATTER?

Being late to school can have a considerable impact over the whole school year. The table below shows you how much time can be missed over a year by being late to school every day.

5 minutes late every day = 3 days of school lost a year
10 minutes late every day = 6.5 days of school lost a year
15 minutes late every day = 10 days of school lost a year
20 minutes late every day = 13 days of school lost a year
30 minutes late every day = 19 days of school lost a year

School mornings can be very busy but when your child is late for school they are missing out on vital parts of their education and in particular the start of the school day. It is also disruptive for the whole class if pupils arrive at different times throughout the morning. If your child arrives 30 minutes after the register has been taken they will have an unauthorised absence for the whole session.
