Writing Week





2024's Writing Week was a week to remember. In fact, it was a week for the whole school to remember the day our school opened almost 150 years ago.

The children have had a brilliant time learning all about what life was like back in 1874. They learned about what children did before there were schools like Dalmain. They also learned how things changed in the Victorian era. And they imagined what the world might be like in another 150 years.

The teaching team planned epic writing experiences for all the children. The week's writing journey went like this:

In Early Years, children marked pictures that showed what made them, them, and also wrote out what they love about school.

Year 2 imagined our first ever pupil (the first pupil name in the records is Ada Glasswick), and then wrote the transcript of an interview they imagined recording with Ada.

Year 3 imagined a diary entry after a child's first day at Dalmain, while Year 4 contrasted the workhouse with life at school.

Year 5 looked into the Education Act, the law which led to Dalmain being built. They debated the Bill, then wrote speeches in favour and against, before writing them up.

Finally, Year 6 imagined the world of 2174, and sent a message to the future about

Dalmain in 2024.

What a week! We hope you enjoyed looking at the writing at our exhibition in the playground on the last day before half term. We're all really excited about celebrating our 150th birthday over the coming months. It's going to be a wonderful moment in the history of our school.

A Celebration of Inclusion at Dalmain

We were delighted to welcome two groups of external professionals in to audit our provision for pupils with SEND to help us learn and grow. It was a real pleasure to show the visitors around our school and to share our exceptional practice with other professionals. They observed lessons, talked to children about their learning and also spoke to staff about their training. We wanted to share some of the lovely comments we received from them:

"Continuous examples of positive relationships with the children, which made for a calm environment."

"Behaviour for learning and pupil focus strong in each class seen."

"Children reported that they like coming to school and were positive about their experiences during the day."

"All staff know the children with EHC plans and the strategies, provisions and recommendations for these students. This information is shared regularly with all staff."

"Evidence of strong communication at every level across the school."

"Leaders know the context of the school in relation to the SEND data. This is broken into area of need and is compared with local and national averages. This is evaluated each term and shared with staff."

"Pupils with need had infrastructure in place to support them – wiggle cushions / ear protectors / iPad / laptops – pupils supported, keeping the environment calm."



We have also got two food waste bins in the playground – perfect for fruit peels and cores we have at break times!




Reception—Pegasus Class


We really enjoyed Writing Week and even received a letter from 150 years ago telling us what school was like. So then we wrote



This may have been a short half term but we've crammed it full with learning in Phoenix Class.



Have you ever heard of a bear who could play the piano? Nor had we until we read a fabulous book

called *'The Bear and The Piano.'* We wrote our own versions, featuring guitar-playing lions, drumming snakes and other musical animals.

Our Maths has focused on multiplication and we are very solid on our 2s, 5s and 10s. Test us during half term! And in Science, we loved learning about how animals adapt to their habitats. We also learned a very catchy song about habitats!


We've loved finding out about Emily

Wilding Davison, the famous suffragette, and Rosa Parks who inspired the civil rights movement. While comparing the two, we noticed that Rosa Parks was born on the year Emily Wilding Davison died.

Emily Wilding Davison was born about 150 years ago, just like Dalmain School. We loved finding out about what school was like 150 years ago and enjoyed writing an interview with our first ever pupil. Next term we are going to be learning more about our fabulous city, London. It's going to be great!



Year 2—Sphinx Class



We have loved reading 'The Bear and the Piano,' a story all about a bear with an extraordinary musical talent. Whilst reading the book we discussed the author's use of the past tense, expanded noun phrases and the hidden meaning of the story. The book inspired us to write our own narratives



and we each chose an animal, instrument and big, bright city to have as the story line.

In Maths, we have been learning our 2's, 5's and 10 times tables through grouping and using the commutative law to spot helpful patterns! We are now confident in identifying the factors and products in different multiplication expressions as well as creating our own representations.

During RE researched the meaning and traditional celebrations performed during Hindu weddings. As a class

we loved creating our own unique henna designs and imagining what our 5 senses would experience when attending a Hindu wedding.

Our PSHE topic this term was 'Keeping Safe and Managing Risks', we discussed how to be responsible inside and outside of the classroom and the importance of rules to ensure our safety.

This term Sphinx Class have produced some superb work across all lessons and have celebrated 150 years of Dalmain by reading the first ever school log book, dating back to 1874!



Dalmain's school uniform consists of:

Year 3-Griffin Class



What a brilliant term we've had in Year 3!

Before we were introduced to our new text in English, we became archaeologists! We had the amazing opportunity of digging up some interesting artefacts that were buried in our sand trays. This helped us as a class to generate a few ideas of what our new text is going to



be about in English. We then began reading 'Escape from Pompeii' which tells the story of what happens in the City of Pompeii when Mount Vesuvius erupts.

In Teaching of Reading, we have been exploring different natural disasters through reading a book called

'Earth Shattering Events'. In Maths we have been looking closely at right angles



and we had the opportunity of going outdoors to the playground to look for any right-angles that we can find around us.

In Geography, we have been identifying the different parts of a Volcano and how it is formed. In Science, we carried out an exciting experiment where we investigated the different types of soil and recorded what we could see.

Finally, in Computing we explored the work of Kandinsky and how this artist incorporates lines and shapes within his work. We had so much funusing the IPADs to create our own versions!

Year 3-Makara Class

Spring 1 in Makara Class has been an exciting journey of discovery and learning. I am thrilled to share the highlights of our adventures! Here are some of the comments from the children in Makara class.


"I liked using different strategies in Maths to solve problems." "I enjoyed learning how to measure right angles by using the shapes we'd cut from paper."

In Maths we were introduced to right angles and how to identify a right angle. We really enjoyed going around the playground trying to find right angles.

In RE we explored the traditions of Shabbat, we gained a great insight into the practice of Jewish families on their sacred day. In Geography, we learnt all about fascinating volcanoes around the world and how they are formed. We decided it would be a little bit too dangerous to live near an active one!

In Science, we learnt how rocks change over time and processes like fossilisation which happen over thousands of years. It has been a quick but brilliant half term and we can't wait for Term 4 and then our wonderful 150 year anniversary celebrations later this year!









TALKING TEENS



Family Thrive Early Help Co-ordinators are running a free course for parents or carers of teenagers and pre-teens who are looking to better understand and communicate with them – It offers an opportunity to understand what's going on in the adolescent brain and how to understand their feelings and behaviours using an authoritative parenting style. Sessions will focus on relationships within the family, communication, negotiation, decision-making and strategies to reduce conflict.

The group aims to develop:

- relationships between teenagers and parents/carers
- · a calmer home life
- · confidence when talking about difficult issues
- · an understanding of teenage needs and development

Who would be eligible to attend this course?

- Parents and carers of pre-teens and teenagers who are currently in years 6 & 7 but there may be availability for years 5 & 8
- There is no physical or extremely challenging behaviour present in or outside of the family home.
 This course focuses on the importance of empathy and positive discipline
- · Family must reside in Lewisham borough or child must attend a Lewisham school

How long is the course?

- · Each group is 4 sessions over the course of 4 weeks
- 2 hours per session (10.00am-12.00pm)

Year 4-Sprite Class

Although it has been a short term, Sprite class have had many exciting learning experiences.

In their writing lessons, they explored the book 'The Matchbox Diaries' by Paul Fleischman. This book tells the story of a migrant who travelled from Italy to America in the 1900s. The children explored the text in various ways, including role-playing, diary entries, and biographies.

In Maths, they focused on fractions and used concrete and pictorial resources to understand the concept of wholes and parts.





During their History lessons, the children learned about the Roman Empire and its invasion of Celtic Britain. They looked at Roman artefacts and how the Roman Empire advanced Britain. In Science, the students learned about sound waves by experimenting with different objects to see how sound travels and how pitch changes. We are eagerly anticipating the upcoming learning

opportunities!





Year 4-Selkie Class

What another great term in Year 4! Our topic in History has been The Roman Empire. We have learnt so many interesting and wonderful things about the Roman Empire including where they came from, the strength of their army and why they invaded Britain. In Writing, we have been reading *'The Matchbox Diary'* by Paul Fleischman. This is a heart-warming tale of an Italian-American immigrant who shares his childhood memories with his great-granddaughter. We have written very informative biographies about his inspiring life.





In Maths, we have been studying fractions. In Teaching of Reading, we have been exploring an intriguing book called 'Viking Voyagers' by Jack Tite. We initially thought that Vikings were just fierce warriors but there we have discovered so much about their interesting culture and fascinating mythology.



And we can't wait to share our Writing Week work with you at our exhibition on Friday. The history of our school really is incredibly fascinating and we are so looking forward to the anniversary celebrations later this year! Have a great half term everyone.

The Spring Term has got off to a flying start with children across the school producing incredible work in both Art and DT.









Children in Year 1 have been learning about artists Damian Hurst Tiberius Soos, exploring their abstract depictions of beetles and butterflies. Children have been learning about colour mixing and experimenting with painting techniques to develop their own work using ink and acrylic.







Year 2 children have been working incredibly hard in their sketchbooks to prepare for our enormous 3m silk batik painting exploring art activism and the story of the Water Protectors. The final collaborative painting will be revealed next half term!





Children in Year 3 have been Learning about volcanoes. In DT, both classes have constructed their own model volcano which reproduces an eruption with dust clouds and lava flow!

In Year 4 children have been using sound vibrations to create paint effects with powder paint and printing techniques to recreate the sound patterns of their names to overlay over their backgrounds.







Year 5 children have been completing their flying machines inspired by the story of Icarus and had the wonderful opportunity to see Antony Gormley's exhibition at the White Cube as a follow up to their studio visit last year.











Year 6 have been learning about the history of anatomy this half term, producing incredible drawings of human bones and organs using a variety of drawing media.



Year 5-Kraken Class

This half-term in Year 5, our theme has been 'Belonging and Equality' and Kraken class have been exploring and analysing two key texts: "Freedom Bird" by Jerdine Nolan and "Black and British" by David Olusoga. Both texts provide an excellent platform for discussions on issues such as racism, discrimination and the yearning for freedom. In history we continued this theme by exploring the Battle of Lewisham and the growing antifascist movement in South London.

Elsewhere in the curriculum, we looked at Materials and their properties in Science where we carried out scien-

tific enquiries and put them to the test. Additionally, we used Scratch in order to do coding in our Computing lessons and we continued our journey on Hinduism by looking at important pilgrimages that Hindus undertake in RE.

This half-term Kraken Class also went on two trips: we visited the Planetarium in Greenwich, where the children applied their knowledge of the Solar System during an interactive show and workshop; we also went to Anthony Gormley's White Cube museum, where the children were given a guided tour of the various amazing sculptures.

Year 5-Chimera Class

Chimera class have had a short but jam-packed first term of 2024! We have explored the overarching theme of Belonging and Equality through our writing work based on Freedom Bird, our reading lessons around David Olusoga's Black and British an in our History learning about the Battle of Lewisham. The children have enjoyed carrying out experiments into the properties of materials in Science and creating their own online maths quizzes in Scratch in Computing. We have continued to learn about Hinduism in RE; this term exploring pilgrimages. In PE, the children have started to create and rehearse their dance for their upcoming Laban show (it is looking incredible already!) and we have had fun learning the basics of tag rugby. Outside of school, Chimera

Year 6

Our main topic this term has been Activism and Social Change. In English we have been reading 'Suffragette: A Battle for Equality' by David Roberts. We have learnt about the history of the women's suffrage movement and their fight for equality. We have also learnt about the Match Stick Girls strike. To show our solidarity to these courageous women we have written speeches to highlight their plight. In Teaching of Reading we have been reading 'The Little Match Girls Strikes Back.' This book has provided us with a different perspective of the classic tale.

We have just come to the end of another exciting Writing Week. We have travelled back in time to 1874 to explore what school life was like for the first Dalmainians. We then travelled 150 years to 2174 and pondered what our school and its pupils would be up to...would there be hologram teachers?

In Maths, we have been learning about statistics, and how to interpret and draw line graphs. After this, we completed the Pie Chart Challenge! We created our own surveys, gathered our own data and we then presented the information in a pie chart.

Art is definitely one of our favourite subjects in Year 6 and we have really enjoyed the anatomy project we have been working on. We produced different body parts, including hearts and bones, using techniques such as shading, hatching and blending.

Special Education Needs & Disability (SEND) Paediatric Dietitians

The community special educational need and disabilities (SEND) dietetic service is a new service for children and young people in the borough of Lewisham. It launched in September 2023.

Our dietitians offer nutritional advice and strategies including:

- Healthy eating, portion sizes, fluid intake and oral nutritional supplements
- Ways to fortify food to provide the energy or nutrients needed
- · Healthy lifestyle behaviours
- Referrals to other community health services to support the young person and their family.

We see children and young people:

- With neurodevelopmental conditions, chromosomal abnormalities leading to developmental disorders and/or learning difficulties
- With other disabilities and conditions requiring an Education and Health Care Plan (EHCP) registered with a Lewisham GP
- Aged 0-19 years old, who don't have an EHCP but are having an assessment with known SEND needs, registered with a Lewisham GP
- Who attend a special educational needs school in Lewisham

When to refer to us?

Faltering growth

Criteria

- Weight <0.4th centile
- Weight at 2 centiles below height centile
- Rapid weight loss

Restrictive dietary intake

Criteria

- Consuming < 10 food items
- · Exclusion of a whole food group
- Prescribed diet such as milk-free or wheat-free diet leading to concern with malnutrition
- Faltering growth (weight two centiles below the height centile)
- Overweight or obese (weight >98th centile and BMI > 91st centile)

Overweight / Obesity

Criteria

- Weight >98th centile
- BMI > 91st centile

Attendance

Your child's attendance at school every day is vital for their progress and attainment, both academically and socially. Poor attendance can affect children's ability to make and keep friendships, which is a vital part of growing up, and of course we don't want any child falling behind academically at this crucial time in their educational careers.

We have high aspirations for every child, and we are committed to enabling all of our pupils to achieve and sustain the highest level of attendance, believing that every lesson counts. We encourage good attendance for these reasons and to fulfill our statutory safeguarding responsibilities.

90% Threshold for Absences

We work directly with families to support good attendance and punctuality. When a child has **20** or more days off school during the year, their attendance will be 90% or below.

Attendance Letters

If your child's attendance falls to 90% or below, you will receive a letter regarding this. If your child's attendance does not improve in four weeks you will receive another letter, and if your child's attendance still fails to improve then you will be invited into the school for an attendance panel meeting.

Sessions Missed

Each 'session' equates to half a day; if your child has missed 10 sessions for example, this means that they have missed 5 days of school.

Covid Absences—DfE changes since September 2021

Unfortunately, should your child have Covid this will now

affect your child's attendance as per the DFE guidelines, which changed at the start of last academic year.

How to Contact Us

When your child is off school, please confirm this in writing via email. You will be asked to provide proof of any appointments your child may have to the School Office either in person, so that the school can retain a photocopy, or you can attach any relevant documents via email.

Please email <u>attendance@dalmain.lewisham.sch.uk</u> by 9:00am (when registers close) if your child is not going to be in school, indicating the specific reason for their absence.

Alternatively you can report absence via ParentMail under Absences.

Thank You For Your Support

We know that you, as your child's parent/carer, want your child to get on well in life. Children only get one chance at school, and your child's chances of a successful future may be affected by not attending school every day on time, so we thank you in advance for your support with this matter.

WHY DOES GOOD ATTENDANCE MATTER?

Above 97%	Less than 6 days absence a year	Excellent attendance! These young people will almost certainly get the best grades they can, leading to better prospects for the future. Pupils will also get into a habit of attending school which will help in the future.
95%	10 days absence a year	These pupils are likely to achieve good grades and form a habit of attending school regularly. Pupils who take a 2 week holiday every year during term time can only achieve 95% attendance.
90%	19 days absence a year	Young people in this group are missing a month of school per year; it will be difficult for them to achieve their best.
85%	29 days absence a year	The Government classes Young People in this group as "Persistent Absentees", and it will be almost impossible to keep up with work.
		Parents of young people in this group could also face the possibility of legal action being taken by the Local Authority.

WHY DOES GOOD PUNCTUALITY MATTER?

Being late to school can have a considerable impact over the whole school year. The table below shows you how much time can be missed over a year by being late to school every day.

5 minutes late every day = 3 days of school lost a year

10 minutes late every day = 6.5 days of school lost a year

15 minutes late every day = 10 days of school lost a year

20 minutes late every day = 13 days of school lost a year

30 minutes late every day = 19 days of school lost a year

School mornings can be very busy but when your child is late for school they are missing out on vital parts of their education and in particular the start of the school day. It is also disruptive for the whole class if pupils arrive at different times throughout the morning. If your child arrives 30 minutes after the register has been taken they will have an unauthorised absence for the whole session.
