


Absolutely Everybody Should Read These Books!


A mixture of classics and new works that every Dalmain child should read by the end of Early Years.

We have a wide range of titles can be found in the school library as well as in classrooms too!




A Little Stuck by Oliver Jeffers


Amazing Grace by Mary Hoffman


Anna Hibiscus' Song by Atinuke


Bears Don't Read! by Emma Chichester Clark


Blown Away by Rob Biddulph


Lonely Beast by Chris Judge


Each Peach Pear Plum by Allan Ahlberg, Janet Ahlberg


Elmer by David McKee


Farmer Duck by Martin Waddell
